Pastors 2 Cents From: Fr. Jim DeBruycker

As I have spoken of many times, I worked within the Bell Telephone System for twelve years. I was a highly skilled technical electrical worker, working for the manufacturing and supply division of the Bell system known endearingly as Ma Bell. One of the reasons it was called Ma Bell was because it had rules and regulations for almost every event of your life. Every garage had a copy of the multivolume Bell System Practices Manual (BSPM). Inside you would find technical information, along with customer relationship criteria and even some sanitary practices you should have learned at home. (I remember one unmarried man on our crew who thought he might find a way to find a wife in its pages!) It also had regular reports on workplace accidents and how they could have been avoided. I only saw one accident considered an 'act of God' in all the years I worked there and that was a truck that had been struck by a meteor. *No job is so important or customer so valuable that we cannot take time to do our job safely...* or something like that. That phrase was plastered all over the walls in the office, many times with a model of a pair of glasses with a screwdriver puncturing one lens.

There is no doubt the BSMP was overkill, but it did give everyone a standard Method of Procedure (MOP), or a standard of correct operation. I am writing this on July 11th, the feast day of St. Benedict (CE 480-547). In CE 516 he wrote his Rule which is still the rule of Benedictines, and the basis for many other religious orders--kind of the BSMP for living peacefully in community. It was so powerful a document that Benedict has been called the father of Europe by many. The time from the fall of Rome to the rise of Charlemagne was considered the Dark Ages in Europe, a time of lawlessness and decay. The monasteries became symbols of enlightenment and order that civil society looked to and began to emulate as they regrouped and restructured. When I interview marriage couples with the nuptial questionnaire, I often tell them that the great gift of the Catholic Church to the world was bureaucracy, and the rule was at the heart of that.

At the heart of the Rule of St. Benedict is proper balance. If you attended St. John's University, you could not have graduated without hearing about Worship and Work. Benedict was wise in the ways of humanity, he knew about the workaholic and the over passionate scrupulous religious fanatic. His rule put both extremes within sane wraps so they did not destroy the workings of the community. Although I naturally side with Martha over Mary in today's Gospel, we witness Jesus trying to establish a balance between work and prayer. Sometimes the best practice is to shut up and listen.

A Recipe for Resilience: Here are revolutionary love practices for this moment. Choose what you need. Share it.

GRIEVE: What is the shape of grief in your body? If you feel the primal scream in you, this is the time to make space for healing. Let yourself touch the sorrow, rest and breathe. Don't isolate. Show up to a healing circle in your community. Organize one if needed. Go to vigils. Be with people who make you feel safe. Let in softness and love into the places that ache. Make space to just stop — and feel this together.

RAGE: What is the force of rage in your body? Notice where you are constricted, tense, or numb. Now move that energy – curse, scream, shake, dance, run. Don't choke down your rage. Or let it fester. Be with people who can honor this rage and process it in safe containers. Your rage carries information – what is it telling you? You have something to fight for. You have a role to play, and no role is too small.

FIGHT: What courageous step are you ready to take? Do not swallow the lie that nothing can be done. You have a sphere of influence. Every choice we make – every word, every action, every encounter – co-creates culture and shapes what happens next. Will you use your voice, your art, your story, your money, your power, your heart?

REIMAGINE: What is the world you want? What does beloved community look like, feel like? We can only live into what we imagine. Protect time and space to dream and dream big. Then take one step toward that dream.

LISTEN: What do you need to approach opponents with humanity? If you are safe enough, take one step toward a courageous conversation. Lead with your story, above all. Listen for theirs.

BREATHE: How will you breathe today? This is the work of a lifetime. Our lifetime. Take time to rest, step away from the news, nourish your body and your beloveds. Remember the wisdom of the midwife: Breathe, my love, then push. When joy comes, let it come. In joy, we presage the world to come. - Valerie Kaur - 2022



Wedding Policies: Weddings at St. Joan of Arc are provided as a service to members of the parish community. For a wedding to take place at SJA, it is necessary that one of the engaged couple be a registered member of the parish for at least six months before a wedding date can be set. A date can only be scheduled by one of the priests after an initial interview with the engaged couple. A minimum of six months from the time the date is set to the wedding is necessary in order to complete requirements. In cases where there has been a previous marriage ending in divorce, it is not possible to set the wedding date until notice of an annulment is in hand.
