Pastor's 2 Cents From: Fr Jim DeBruycker

May 11,1957, 66 years ago at The Church of St. Bernard's, in the North End of Saint Paul, a block off Rice Street, I made my 1st Communion. I still have my certificate of 1st Communion. It has a picture of Jesus passing out communion on it assisted by St. Pope Pius X. Pius was pictured, because he felt communion should be received as early as possible, and lowered the 1st Communion age from 12 to 7. He received the title 'pope of the Eucharist'.

We received 1st Communion at the Sunday mass. The boys were dressed in a white shirt with bow ties, blue slacks and polished black shoes, NO TENNIS SHOES - God and (Fr. Theodore) forbid. Girls were dressed in those faux white wedding dresses with veils, white anklets and polished white shoes. In our left hand we carried small missals, the boys with black leather covers, the girls with white covers. Draped over the missals were rosaries. Here was where our individuality was celebrated, you had the choice of a crystal, white, black or silver beaded rosary. I was an oddball even then, I went with the silver - long lost to posterity. In our right hand we carried a candle reminiscent of our baptism.

We processed in single file, of course genuflecting with great piety before we entered our pew, making sure we kept our candles erect and not dropping our missals. When everyone was in place Sr. Agnes clicked a clicker and in good Catholic unison we knelt down, upright head forward, with Sister guarding us from behind. At communion time we lined up at the altar railing, missal, rosary, and candles in hand in unison we knelt down with tongues properly extruded and received the Eucharist on our tongue, hoping the wafers didn't stick to the roof of our moths and the altar boy didn't hit our Adam's apple with the patten placed under our chin. We had finally made it.

There were a lot of stressors. You had to make sure you didn't by accident eat something three hours before communion. Mother would warn us not to swallow any tooth paste and inveterate gum chewers went through withdrawal, although there was always one youngster pulled out of the communion line because he snapped his bubblegum. Of course afterwards there was the big feast, my cousin recently gave me a picture of seven year old Jimmy D with crewcut standing in front of my Godparents at the party. On Monday after 1st Communion, as was my grandmothers tradition, she took me to a movie downtown, I believe it was Lady and the Tramp, then we went to the Religious Book shop in the Hamm Building, owned by our own Jim Potts - who knew we would reconnect 50 years later - and pick out a statue of St. Joseph, which I still have although baby Jesus has had some brain damage due to a sibling altercation - not my fault.

Congratulations to our 1st Communicants, this is a big day for you and your family. Luckily, I hope you are a little less stressed than we were and you have a great celebration with many great memories.
