Pastor's 2 Cents From: Fr. Jim DeBruycker

*While from a proud tower in the town
Death looks gigantically down.*

Barbara Tuchman entitled her book, *The Proud Tower* from a line of Edgar Allen Poe's poem, *The City in the Sea*. The poem tells of a city which does not realize it is condemned to destruction, living as if all was normal. She sees it as an allegory of pre-World War One Europe, a culture divided between the very rich and poor, stockpiling weapons, pretending they would never use them; they were too civilized. The ruling elite, because of their arrogance, almost completely destroyed the pre-war civilization and created the fertile ground for the greatest holocaust of all time.

What brought this to mind again for me was a documentary now playing on TPT, *The Home Movies of Nazi Germany*-not exactly the most light-hearted series. What they show is a society dancing prior to the apocalypse, seemingly unaware- or uncaring-of the evil they were participating in. It forever puts to rest the idea that the general German population was unaware of the atrocities their government was committing. Mixed in with everyday family situations are movies of deportations, mass executions, and wanton destruction of whole cities, and the quality of all the films like most of our home movies processed at that time at the corner drug store. You go from middle class kids' birthday parties to mass shootings and hangings. All done with the smiling banter of a family get-together. Of course, as the war progresses, the realization of entering hell starts to dawn.

The question it brings to my mind is, 'how did this happen?' The philosopher Hannah Arendt coined the term the *banality of evil*. How could one of the most civilized cultures in the world, the home of Beethoven, Einstein, Freud, countless scientists and philosophers, create monsters? It was like the frog slowly being boiled to death in the pot, realizing too late it was doomed. Starting with resentment at defeat and 'the big lie' of Jewish betrayal, the political party offered a salvation that was more than willing to use violence to promote its victory and agenda. Before they knew it, German society had surrendered its freedom and moral authority.

Who could imagine a society that would welcome violence against people for wearing a mask or for asking people to protect themselves with a vaccination? Or to pass laws which condemn people for trying to protect themselves? Or congratulates media for promoting a big lie?

Catholic Social Teaching: The Foundation of Our Faith and Our Shared Future. The principles of CST offer us a powerful lens through which to see and love the world as God does. They are a blueprint for us in overwhelming times:

- **Human Dignity:** Every one of us is created in the image and likeness of God.
- **Common Good:** We realize our human dignity in relationship and community.
- **Option for the Poor:** The moral test of our society is how we treat our most vulnerable.
- **Rights and Responsibilities:** We all have a fundamental right to what is needed to live in dignity - life, food, shelter, health care, education, employment. We also have a responsibility to participate in our public life together.
- **Role of Government:** The state has a positive moral function to promote human dignity, protect human rights and build the common good.
- **Economic Justice:** All workers have the right to decent and fair wages and safe working conditions. No one is allowed to amass excessive wealth while others lack the basic necessities of life.
- **Stewardship of God's Creation:** We are called to live in right relationship with the earth.
- **Promotion of Peace and Disarmament:** Peace is not just the absence of war. Peace is the fruit of justice.
